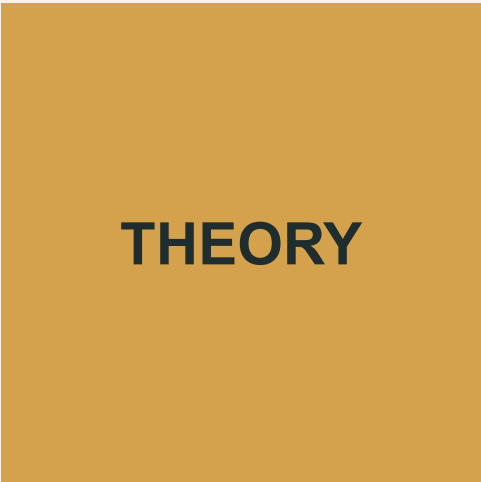

From discrimination law to construction codes

LEGISLATION

- **1993** — Disability Discrimination Act (DDA)
- **2000** — Sydney Olympic & Paralympic Games
- **2008** — Australia ratifies the UN CRPD
- Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities
- **2010** — Access to Premises Standards (APS)
- **NCC 2022** — Livable housing provisions adopted – except NSW and WA
- **NCC 2025** — Adoption progressive – not in NT
- Deemed to satisfy & performance solutions

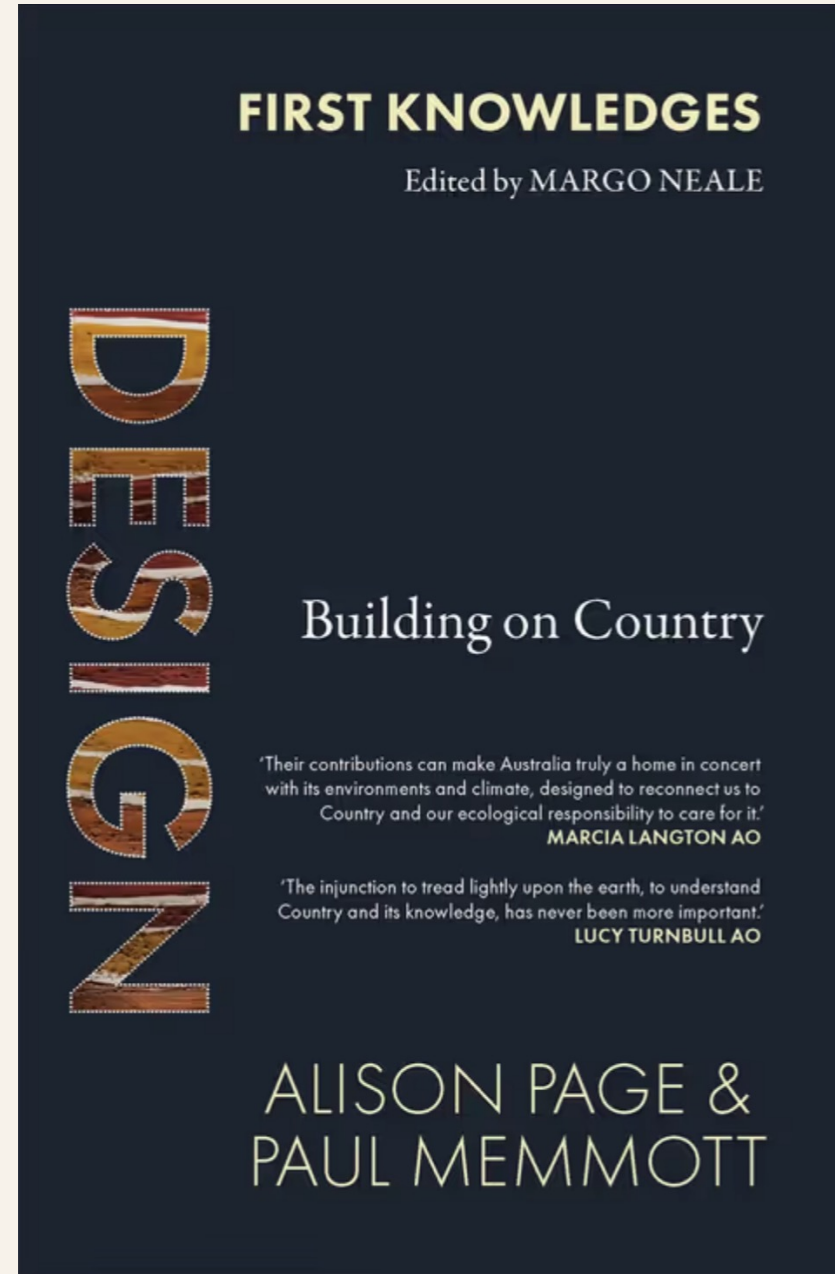
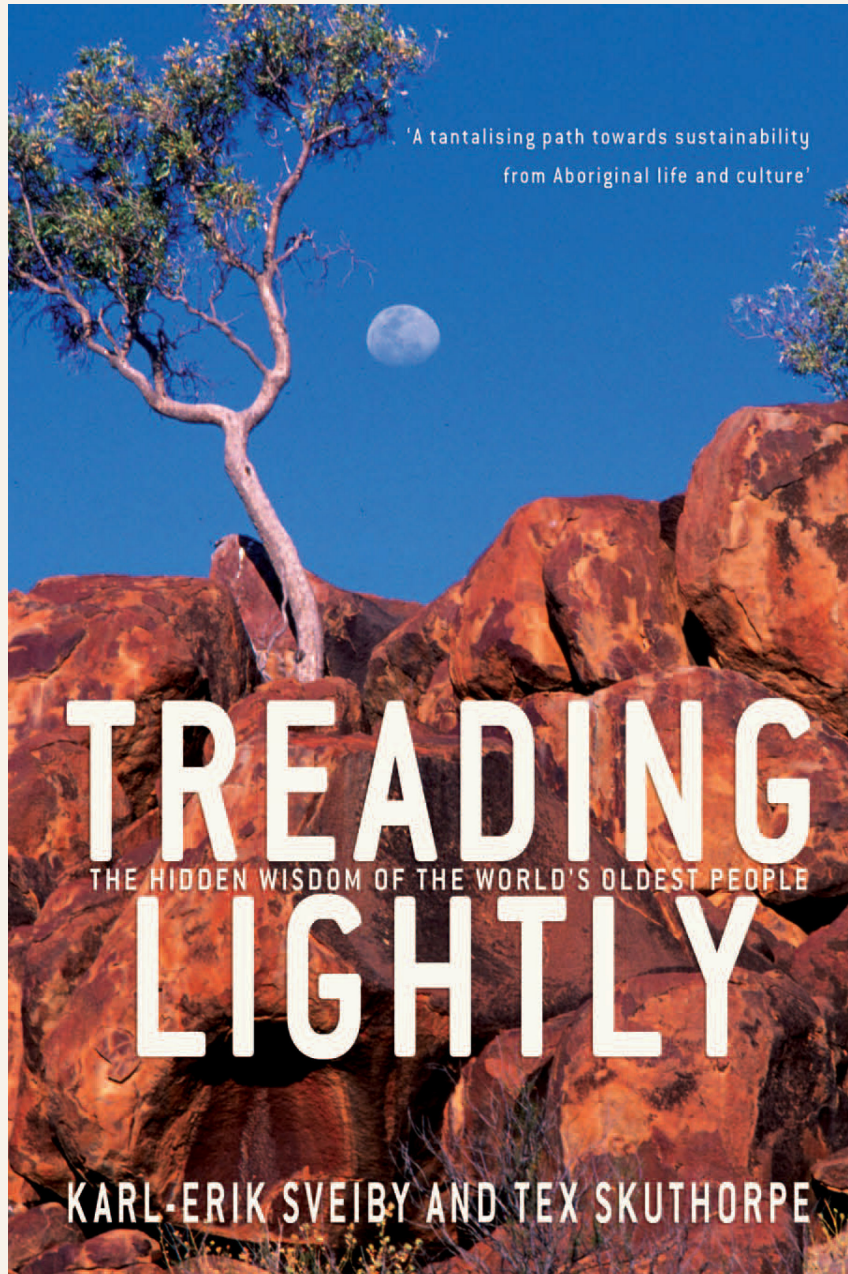

FPDN ensure accessibility in all its forms by embedding cultural, physical, digital, and systemic inclusivity into our practices.

- *First Peoples Disability Network responds to Minister Butler's NDIS overhaul*
- First Peoples Disability Network Australia (FPDN) joins Australia's Disability Representative Organisations in a statement calling for people with disability to lead the design of the NDIS reforms announced by Minister Mark Butler at the National Press Club.
- **FPDN CEO and Worimi man Damian Griffis, said:**
- “Minister Butler said today that the NDIS is a measure of our national character. We agree. And the measure of these reforms will be whether they protect or further exclude the most marginalised Australians, First Nations people with disability living in communities where many of the services simply do not exist in the first place.
- “The Minister invoked **‘nothing about us without us.’** We are here to hold him to that. First Nations people with disability were not mentioned in today's speech. That silence is not acceptable.
